20's Plenty

As we are sure you will remember, we had a speed survey conducted over a one week period in September. One survey was on Hornby Road and this concluded that adherence to the 30mph limit was generally satisfactory at the eastern end of Hornby road by the Shorthorn site but that at the western end of the village there was a significant percentage of speeds well in excess of the 30mph speed limit. This has been notified to the North Yorks Police, as have all the speed survey results, by the NY Highways Dept.

The second survey was conducted on Front street with one set of the speed tubes between the pre-school and the Primary School and the other one by the entrance to the play area/tennis courts. This survey concluded that due to recorded speeds at or around 20mph, that the appropriate speed on Front Street should be 20mph. This would then include Baker Street and short piece of Prospect View by the triangle.

The good news is that the NY Police now support the introduction of 20mph, however we now await NY Highways to make their decision. Hopefully they will give it their support but even if they do, it make take some to implement due to resourcing and budgetary constraints.

PUBLIC RIGHTS OF WAY - LOCAL FOOTPATHS

The Parish Council joined a scheme with North Yorkshire Council in April of this year. The Path Keepers Scheme. This scheme is free to the parish council and gives interested individuals permission to undertake surveying and certain types of maintenance work, within NYC's responsibilities, on an agreed right of way. NYC have a duty to "assert and protect the rights of the public" to use public highways, by keeping them capable of use and free from obstruction. A public right of way is a way over which the public has a right to "pass and repass", whether or not the land is privately owned.

Landowners are directly responsible for the maintenance of furniture along the Right of Way, this includes gates and stiles. They are also responsible for maintaining access across ploughed or cropped arable fields, and ensuring the path remains free of overgrowing vegetation and obstructions.

The Public Rights of Way Officer has visited the Rounton path and the river bank erosion and flooding issues have been reported and added to NYC work schedule. This path is allocated 2 cuttings per year by NYC, at the start and end of the season. This path in the past was very popular but it has been reported to the Parish Council that the path has become difficult for walkers, children and dogs to the extent of being inaccessible. The Parish Council has reported this to NYC who has deemed "the usage of a low level and therefore would not be a priority on their work schedules."

Appleton Wiske village is fortunate to be surrounded by a group of public rights of way footpaths and it is up to us as residents to ensure these are used and maintained.

To report a footpath issue there is an online form to be completed for NYC. You can find this at www.northyorks.gov.uk/roads-parking-and-travel/public-rights-way/rights-way-maintenance

Log in the issue using the online form, select exact location, issue logged You will need to create a password for NYC and you will be required to give your postcode and use the location identifier and footpath number if you can.. You can also provide and upload photos.

When reporting a footpath issue to North Yorkshire Council you can remain anonymous. Alternatively you can report this to the Parish Council. It would be useful to have a group of volunteers to help in cutting back minor overgrowth, using hand tools. Please let the Parish Council know of your interest and that could possibly lead to a village volunteer day.

Village Green Tubs

The flower tubs on the village green are now all planted up with a lovely large centre shrub and the spring daffodil bulbs are nestled just below the compost surface waiting to break into colour in the spring.

The tubs are on the village green outside some peoples houses and we have asked those people firstly to be responsible for keeping them watered throughout the year but also if they would like to put out plants, not shrubs, around them to give some colour such as flowering pansies geraniums etc. for the summer.


If you would like to put plants in any of the empty tub surrounds, please see Jackie in the village shop to enquire

Edible: Quinces, beetroot, Brussels sprouts, maincrop potatoes, carrots, kale, chard, garlic, leeks, parsnips, swedes, pumpkins, winter squashes, chervil, parsley, coriander, sage, rosemary, bay.

The Pond: A life saver for garden birds, expect to be visited by noisy gangs of sparrows bathing in the shallows and drinking the icy water as well as goldfinches, blackbirds and robins.

THE LARGEST NAVAL, AIR AND LAND OPERATION IN HISTORY

D, standing for Day, a code for any day or important invasion or military operation. From 6th June 1944 to the end of August 1944, the allies had reached The Seine River, Paris was liberated and the Germans had been removed from north western France, concluding The Battle of Normanby.

6th June 2024 marks 80 years since the D-Day landings, the largest amphibious operation in history. Many sacrifices were made and it is an opportunity to show our recognition and gratitude of our country. Casualties for the UK were 65,000 including 11,000 killed and 54,000 wounded or missing. There are a series of commemorations and events planned across the UK and France:

- The International D Day beacon will be lit in Normanby at 8.15pm BST
- At the British Normanby Memorial at Portsmouth the beacon will be lit at 9.15pm
- As Beacons are lit all communities are asked to mark this international tribute
- An International ceremony will take place on Omaha Beach on Thursday 6th June 2024
